

## Take a hike on Britain's longest footpath


The **South West Coast Path**, Britain's longest footpath, traces the both coasts of Devon, offering easy access to wild and windswept cliffs, secluded sandy coves and remote hamlets. There are occasional pubs and cafés on the path, and a regular bus network means you can dip in and out as you please. If you're on a multi-day trip, [Luggage Transfers](#) (01326 567247) will drop off your luggage at your accommodation each day.

**Insider tip:** Clovelly to Hartland Point is the most dramatic section, while Bantam to Salcombe has a string of postcard-pretty beaches. The further away you are from a car park, the more likely you are to find a cove to yourself.

## Photography winners expose the treasures of South Devon

A stunning photo of the South Hams has been announced as one of the winners of a top photography competition.

Almost 500 people entered the Visit South Devon 2019 Photo Competition, which ran between April and September.

The photographs had a principal brief – to capture the essence of South Devon and highlight the region at its best.

From the 468 entries, Visit South Devon faced the difficult deed of selecting the final 25 images, which were then put out to public vote.

Third place was awarded to Robert Davey, from Plymouth, for his image of Shaugh Prior on Dartmoor.

Robert said: "I was delighted to find out my photograph achieved third place in the 2019 Visit South Devon Photography Competition."

"I took this photo while taking a walk on the moors just outside of Shaugh Prior, as I have recently moved to the area and wanted to get to know my new local surroundings."

"It was a clear summer evening and the sunset was providing a beautiful backdrop to my view of St Edward, King, and Martyr Church. Fortunately, I had my camera with me! It's amazing to think that I now have views like this right on my doorstep!"

Anna Roach, marketing executive at Visit South Devon said: "With its stunning coast, beautiful countryside and the spectacular South Devon AONB, it is not surprising that there were 14 South Hams images in the 25 finalists of the 2019 South Devon Photo Competition."

"This included the atmospheric third place image of Shaugh Prior at sunset taken by Robert Davey, as well as wonderful images of Dartmouth, Start Point,

Slapton Sands and Burgh Island, among others."

The overall winner was Rich Walker, from Plymouth, for his image of Paignton Pier. Rich's image will be used as the main image on the Visit South Devon website for the next three months. Rich said: "I really am pleased to have won this competition, I wasn't expecting to win and I'd like to thank everyone who voted for me, it's a great honour."

Anna Roach added: "We have been astounded by the superb standard of this year's entries, and it was a really tough task choosing the top 25 from such an eclectic array of photographs."

"We were inspired by Rich's image as it captures both the magic and mystery of the striking South Devon coastline that this part of the county has to offer."

Jane Williams, from West Yorkshire, was awarded second place for her image of the Royal William Yard in Plymouth. The runner-up images will be used as the cover photos for the Visit South Devon Facebook and Twitter accounts until the end of the year.

As well as the top three images receiving online exposure, each photographer has won an individual prize:

● 1st Prize – Premier Holiday Caravan Break for up to four people in 2020 at Beverley Holidays in the English Riviera.

● 2nd Prize – A short break in a Glamping Pod at Ladram Bay Holiday Park for up to four people in 2020.

● 3rd Prize – A Family Day Pass to World of Country Life, which admits two adults and two children.

In addition, all three winning photographers have the opportunity to write a guest blog post on South Devon and photography which will be hosted on the Visit South Devon website blog.

# Moor Links and Tavy Links

If you're thinking about a trip to the coast this summer, here's a reminder of some of our local beauty spots, all linked by the South West Coast Path which was originally created by coastguards on the look-out for smugglers.

## Best for rockpooling

Wembury Beach is one of the best locations in the country to try your hand at rockpooling, with a host of sea life to find from crabs and sea anemones to starfish, pipe fish and blemies. Visit Wembury Marine Centre, before going on a guided rockpool safari, or just explore the rockpools by yourself, but check out the seashore code to keep yourself and wildlife safe at [nationaltrust.org.uk/wembury](http://nationaltrust.org.uk/wembury). As well as rockpool safaris you can also book a snorkel safari around Wembury Bay looking at underwater marine life – see [wemburymarinecentre.org/events](http://wemburymarinecentre.org/events).

Wembury Beach facilities & access: National Trust car park, toilets, seasonal café, access not suitable for wheelchairs, no dogs 1st May – 30th Sep, PL9 0JG

Activities: rockpooling, kayaking, sailing, surfing, coastal walks (seasonal foot-ferry at Yealm Estuary)

## Best for surfing

Widemouth Bay has a long sandy beach at the northerly end and interesting rock formations at the southern end. The conditions are excellent for surfing and body-boarding, and there are several surf schools. It has also received the Blue Flag Beach Award 2019. Widemouth Bay facilities & access: car park, toilets, pubs, cafes, shops, easy access to beach, dogs welcome all year on southern part of beach (Black Rock), no dogs on northern beach Easter to 30 Sep, EX23 0AW

Activities: surfing, body-boarding, swimming, rockpooling, coastal walks

## One of Cornwall's longest beaches

Whitsand Bay is a beautiful 3-mile sandy beach with superb views from Rame Head to Looe. All the access paths are steep but it's worth the walk as you always find an uncrowded stretch of beach. It's also popular for surfers but dangerous rip currents mean caution is necessary.

Whitsand Bay facilities & access: parking at Tregantle, Sharrow Point & Tregonhawke, cliff-top cafés at Tregonhawke and Eddystone Café (with customer toilets) on the beach, lifeguards May – Sep, steep access paths from Tregantle, Sharrow Point, Treathy and Tregonhawke, dogs allowed all year, PL10 1JT

Activities: surfing, swimming, walking, suitable for beach games, monthly beach clean (see [ramepb.org](http://ramepb.org))

Events: 20-22 September Looe Live! – a whole town music festival with 5 stages, see [visitorswall.com/whats-on](http://visitorswall.com/whats-on)

## Old smuggling haunts

The sheltered beaches of Cawsand and Kingsand are great for swimming, snorkelling and boating, and you can even arrive by boat if you catch the seasonal Cawsand Ferry from the Barbican in Plymouth. The quaint fishing villages were a key smuggling centre for the region in the 1700s and early 1800s, when Cawsand was located in Cornwall and Kingsand in Devon – a sign still marks the dividing line.

Cawsand facilities & access: car park, toilets, pubs, cafes, shops, beach suitable for wheelchairs, no dogs Easter – 30th Sep, PL10 1JU



Kingsand facilities & access: car park, toilets, pubs, cafes, shops, no beach access for wheelchairs, dogs allowed all year, PL10 1NF

Activities: swimming, snorkelling, sailing, canoeing, coastal walks

Events: 13 – 15 September Cawsand Bay Guitar Fest 2019 – an exciting weekend of classical guitar plus coastal walks, surfing lessons, coastering, paddle boarding [cawsandbayguitarfest.co.uk](http://cawsandbayguitarfest.co.uk)

## Author's paradise

The beach at Bigbury on Sea has everything – a wide expanse of sand, views across to Bantam and Burgh Island, with the eye-catching Art Deco hotel which inspired two of Agatha Christie's novels, rockpools, watersports and an easy stroll from the car park. The tidal causeway to Burgh Island adds another exciting element and if you get cut off you can always take a ride on the sea tractor.

Bigbury on Sea facilities & access: car park, toilets, café, shop, pub on Burgh Island, lifeguards May – Sep, disabled access to the beach & wheelchair hire from the café, dogs allowed on part of beach, TQ7 4AS

Activities: swimming, bodyboarding, surfing, windsurfing, kite-surfing (hire facilities on beach), coastal walks

## Haven for nature

The one and a half mile long sandy beach at Dawlish Warren is not only beautiful but also has one of the most important locations in the South West for rare species of wildfowl, wading birds and plants at the National Nature Reserve. There are also plenty of amusements and activities to keep everyone occupied and it has retained its Blue Flag award for an impressive 21 consecutive years.

Dawlish Warren facilities & access: car parks, toilets, cafes, shops, pubs, lifeguards May – Sep, disabled access to all areas, dogs allowed on beach, groyne 4 – 9 all year (restrictions apply elsewhere), EX7 0NF

Activities: wildlife visitor centre, swimming, surfing, go karts, rides, amusements, coastal walks

Events: August 10-16 Dawlish Carnival Week, see [dawlishcarnivalweek.co.uk](http://dawlishcarnivalweek.co.uk)

**Four go caravanning in Devon**  
How a return to caravanning became a fun family break

**Wow, caravans are cool!** Certainly that was the case with the rather impressive Bailey Pegasus Grande Bologna that was to be our home for the weekend, with a level of comfort and kit that would put many a hotel room to shame.

We'd been offered the use of this rifty tourer for a long weekend stay in Devon and I have to admit to a slight fit of nerves at the idea. After all, my childhood recollections of family caravan holidays are dominated by memories of being stuck inside a tiny caravan in a remote field, with nothing to do but read by the pale glow of the flickering gas lamps and listen to Terry Wogan on the portable radio while it hammered down outside.

I needn't have worried. Getting down to the Hillhead Caravan and Motorhome Club site in Brioham from Bath took around two and a half hours, and on arrival things were immediately looking good. The welcome from the team on site was warm and friendly, with an offer of a helping hand with the caravan if we needed it.

In fact, we couldn't have been happier with our temporary home. Modern, well-equipped and very comfortable, the Bailey was the perfect antidote to past caravanning nightmares. With the electric little being put straight into action while

we unloaded the car, we were soon getting acquainted with the Pegasus. This four berth caravan comes complete with a family seating area that converts into a double bed, a kitchen fitted out with hob, grill, oven and fridge/freezer, another double bed and a washroom comprising a chemical toilet, sink and shower. Throw in a fair amount of storage space, blown air heating, double glazing and even a TV/DVD player, and we were more than happy.

As for the caravan site, it was tidy, well-equipped and clearly popular, with its 223 pitches all pretty much booked up. There was even a shop, bar, swimming pool, play area and a couple of shower blocks if you didn't want to use the one in your caravan.

OK, yes, to be honest, the bar wasn't really our cup of tea. While the children's hour and evening singers were clearly very popular with most of the site users, it was a bit loud for us, so we preferred to venture off-site for our fun. And that was the great point about Hillhead. As well as being in the middle of some pretty lovely countryside, Torquay was about half an hour away in one direction, with its host of activities and things to do, while a shorter drive the other way took us to the genuinely gorgeous seaside town of Dartmouth – steam railway, boat tours, great crabbing sites and all.

Our long weekend stay saw us taking in the sites of Torquay, before

a trip along to the Woodlands Family Theme Park. To be fair, we could have taken our choice from any number of other family attractions as well – this really is a great area for a full-on family vacation.

Then at the end of each day, we'd return to our new favourite home from home. We were soon into a neat routine of enjoying an evening meal, clearing up, converting the main seating area into the boys' bed (it really is very simple) then relaxing together to watch a DVD or just crashing out. With a fold-away wall allowing us some privacy from the sleeping boys, we grown-ups could chill out with a book or a DVD without disturbing the children.

No, it's not perfect. That chemical toilet doesn't empty itself (don't worry, it's not quite as horrible as it sounds) and I did get a bit tired of having to keep refilling the fresh water tank. Plus, by the very nature of caravans, there isn't much space, making clearing up essential. But it's nothing you don't get used to surprisingly quickly.

So yes, caravanning is without doubt cool. OK, we didn't have to put up with the towing bit and we were lucky to be spoiled with such an impressive caravan, but by the end of our short stay we were already discussing the practicalities of buying our own 'van and whether we'd need a bigger car to tow it. Suddenly those childhood memories were gently dissolving as the wine chilled in the fridge and we planned what to do on our next visit to Devon.

**Torquay Dinosaur World**  
Don't be fooled by the tiny entrance – this is a wonderful venue for a couple of hours' educational fun, complete with fossils, giant spiders and a big box of poo. As soon as you're inside, you'll be discovering life-size and scaled models of dinosaurs, with a Family Explorer Quiz supplied to help you soak up the facts. It was great to see our boys taking their time rather than charging on ahead, as they took in the amazing details of model scenes and found out more about every child's favourite giant creatures.

Best of all, the exhibition is very child-friendly, with plenty of places to sit on the exhibits, interact with the displays and get all hands on. Our favourite bits? Certainly the full size T-Rex fossil skull takes some beating, while the box of genuine dinosaur poo inevitably proved irresistible.

**Living Coast**  
Just along the waterfront from Dinosaur World is another excellent family attraction, the Living Coast zoo and aquarium. We've been to a good few nature centres before, but for us, this was the best one by far. Every aspect has been carefully planned and considered to help visitors get the most out of the experience. As you follow the path around, you can enjoy a series of talks from the keepers as they introduce you to the animals on display, from super cute penguins to gorgeous otters, characterful seals and a plethora of stunning sea-life. Even the beautifully planted garden areas around the venue are perfectly maintained.

Among the highlights is an amazing interactive sandpit where as you shape the sand into mountains and valleys, an overhead sensor maps the area, analyses the change and reacts to it – leading to the appearance of marine animals that move around as you play! Then there's the Draw Alive Wall where you can see the sea creatures which you've coloured in coming to life in front of you!

Another excellent family attraction and absolutely to be recommended.
